You have applied for and been admitted to the Utrecht University Clinical and Health Psychology (CHP) Master's programme 2016-17. On behalf of the whole staff, I would like to give you a warm welcome and wish you will have a fruitful and enjoyable master's study.

This mail contains important information about the master's programme and I do advise you to read the information carefully. It is a rather long mail, sorry for that. There is much to say.

Blackboard

First of all, if all works properly, you have access to the UU master 2016-117 site on <u>Blackboard</u>. If you cannot login to the master site, please notify the <u>Blackboard</u> <u>administration</u>, giving your name, student number and mention that you cannot yet access the CHP master site 2016-17. If your admission has been completed correctly, you will be granted access as soon as possible. The administration will contact you if there are any problems that need to be taken care of before clearance is given to access Blackboard.

On Blackboard you can find general and specific information about the curriculum and practicalities. Please note that some of the pages are still under construction and will be updated in August. Additional information is available <u>here</u>. For practical queries, please contact the study information desk (<u>STIP</u>).

Start-up session Monday September 5

A CHP start-up session is scheduled to take place on 5 September for all new Master's students. During that meeting there will be every opportunity to ask questions and discuss problems with staff members. More details about the meeting will follow in due course, but keep in mind that the CHP start-up meeting will start at 13.30 h and end around 15.00 h. After that meeting a thesis market is organized where students looking for a thesis project will be able to see if there are any projects they are interested in. Usually at this meeting project participation can be settled and students can start immediately afterwards. In Blackboard you can also find a list of thesis projects on offer. That list is being updated as we speak, and will be ready in August.

After the thesis market, an informal CHP social session will take place where students and staff can get to know each other. Some further information will be presented there too, while we all have a bite and a drink. This will probably end around 18.00 h.

Courses starting in September

All students entering the master are <u>automatically registered for participation in three courses</u> that start in September. Two courses are not track specific:

- Academic Professional
- Core Course: Clinical Psychology and Health Promotion

Students entering the Clinical Psychology track additionally are registered for

- Behaviour Therapy and Cognitive Therapy

Students entering the Health Promotion track also are registered for

- Health Promotion: From Theory to Intervention

Get a Buddy!

For students coming from other countries than the Netherlands September will be more than 'just' the start of a new master's study. You probably will need to get to know a new country, a new city and a new university might be a frightening. You don't know where to get a bike, how the university library works, where to find the best bars in town and how to get around in the Netherlands. You may want to find out more about how things are done at CHP or what is expected of you in terms or learning, punctuality, or how to study for an exam. Therefore, getting a Dutch buddy to assist you is probably the smartest thing you can do. The Dutch buddies are here to help you out!

This year the Department of Clinical and Health Psychology, the Faculty of Social Sciences, The SGS Student Association and Buddy Go Dutch will launch a brand new buddy program. The buddy programme is a way of making your integration at the university in your newly adopted city easier, not only at the beginning when you have a lot of practical questions, but also later when you want to meet fellow (Dutch) students.

How it works

International students who come study at Utrecht University can sign up to be matched with a Dutch buddy. Buddies are students at Utrecht University who volunteer to guide you in the Dutch way of life. In addition, all kind of activities are organized by CHP, SGS and Buddy go Dutch for all buddies.

There are two ways of getting a buddy:

- You can choose to sign up for early matching to be matched with a buddy before you arrive in Utrecht. In this way you can already ask your buddy for help before arriving.

- You can choose to find your buddy at the matching event on the 12th of September. In this way you can meet face to face before getting connected to a buddy.

Make sure you indicate on the form that you study at the Faculty of Social Sciences and please specify that your study is Clinical and Health Psychology. This is important because we will try to match you with a student from the same programme and we will organize special events for Dutch and International buddies within our CHP master.
